

Korshak Federal Census Data

The data below is taken from returns for the 1900, 1910 and 1920 Federal Censuses. Several Korshaks—probably David and Mendel, who appear to have emigrated in the 1880's—were no doubt enumerated in the 1890 Federal Census. But a fire destroyed virtually all the documents pertaining to that enumeration a number of years ago. No 1890 individual returns from Illinois have survived.

[Addresses in brackets correspond to the present-day (post-1910) street numbering system. An asterisk indicates data needs to be corrected or otherwise modified]

[The dates given for emigration and naturalization reflect what the census-taker recorded. These dates are not necessarily consistent with the dates given in the actual naturalization documents.]

1900¹ :

¹ Thus far I have been unable to find any enumeration in Illinois of Tevye, Bella or Harry (father of Theodore, Sidney and Marshall). Tevye may already have died. But Bella—for whom I have found a death certificate—lived until September 24th, 1910. According to the certificate, Bella was born in 1846. I suspect that this date was incorrect and that she was, in fact, born roughly a decade earlier. For, according to the 1900 census, the eldest of her six sons, Max J., was born in 1855. The certificate states that she had been a resident of Chicago for fifteen year, suggesting that Bella and Tevye emigrated in 1895—that is thirteen years *after* Mendel and Sonia . Bella was living at 4811 S. Champlain with David and Fanny when she died. She had been at that address for ten days. Her "usual residence", according to the death certificate, was 1234 [S.] Kedzie (there was no Korshak at that address in 1910, according to the Federal Census). Her "occupation" is listed as "retired lived with son from the year 1897 to 1910" Perhaps Tevye died in 1897. The cause of Bella's death was "carcinoma of the large intestine" Her attending physician was Dr. Julius H. Hess. Information for the death certificate was provided by M.[endel] M. Korshak, 1307 W. 13th street. The only documentary evidence of Tevye I have ever seen is a photograph of Tevye and Bella, taken by a photographer named Scholl who, at the time of the Korshak sitting, was located at 547 S. Halsted [1354], according to the printing on the photograph. According to city directories, Scholl was located at that address between 1887 and 1897. I would guess that the photograph was taken around 1897—and that Tevye died not long thereafter. In any case, the Korshaks emigrated *over a period of years*. If they were fleeing pogroms—as Max suggests in his autobiography—they did so gradually. It seems more likely that the more enterprising of the sons—David and Mendel—were sent here first to acquire the capital for the emigration of the

remaining family members and, above all, to determine whether the necessities (and perhaps the luxuries) of life could be obtained in Chicago at less than dull price.

² Max J Korshak and wife whose name is elsewhere rendered as "Genesse", "Gussie" or "Jessie". Married 25 years (i. e., in 1875). Emigrated in 1890—though all family members are listed as having been born in Russia. Nine children, eight living. But daughter Eva had already married Alexander Zurakov (see household #6 below)—so there *were* nine children alive in 1900. (1896 city directory lists Michael J. Korshak (Max J. or possibly Morris?) in partnership with Alexander Zurakov in cigar business). Lived in a building with Sam Gerber (a tannery laborer), his wife Rosie and children Rosie, Dave, Henry, Israel, Benny and Mikie. In the building to the south lived Amato and Angela Mupo; to the north lived Nicola and Antonia Marchetta. The neighborhood was by no means entirely Jewish. Many nationalities were represented. One of the most interesting addresses in the neighborhood was 335 S. Halsted [808], just a stone's throw away. The 1900 Federal Census lists as residents Adams, Jane, 40 (manager); Starr, Ellen, 43 (editor); Lathrop, Julia, 43 (member, state board of charities); Kelly, Florence, 41 (secretary-consumer) along with sixteen others. This was, of course, Hull House.

⁴ Married seven years. Emigrated in 1894. Anna was born in Russia, but Jacob was born in Illinois—which means that the family came to Chicago at some point between May of 1894 and September of 1895. Jacob was later known as "Jack" or "James". Thomas was later known as "Theodore". "Annie" must be "Ida". Two other children, Maurice and

Sidney, were subsequently born. Lived on the first floor of a three-flat. Louis Cohn (a junk peddler) and his wife lived on the second floor. On the third floor lived Frank Cahill (a steam-fitter and second-generation Irishman) and his wife Aggie. Abe's immigration document (Superior Court of Cook County, v. 4 p. 193) gives somewhat different information. It gives his birth date as June 10, 1865. It states that Chicago was his port of entry into the United States, and that he arrived on July 4th, 1893. Abe was naturalized on October 22nd, 1904, at which time he was living at 135 Johnson [1332 S. Peoria]. Witnesses to his naturalization were Harry Korshak (the father of Sidney and Marshal) who was living at 31 Newberry [1038] and Bernice Rodeshevsky who was living at 170 Newberry [1405].

⁵ Listed as "Rubin". Married twelve years. Six children; five living. Emigrated in 1891, prior to September (Isaac was born in Illinois, as were all subsequent children). Not yet naturalized. Reuben was, in fact, naturalized on September 26th, 1906 by the Criminal Court of Cook County, v. 19 p. 197 (naturalizations at the time were effected by the Circuit Court, the Superior Court, and the Criminal Court of Cook County—you could take your pick). According to the court record, Reuben was born September 1st, 1866 and arrived in the United States on May 10th, 1892. He was living at 292 [703] S. Halsted at the time of his naturalization, which was witnessed by Abe Korshak, 573 W. 12th [1410], and Harry D. Siegel, 139 Newberry [1340].

¹² The enumerator who visited the household of David and Fanny in 1900 recorded, for reasons unknown, the birth day (presumed) as well as the month and year—more data than the census regulations required. How accurate is this information? Or any other in "official" or "quasi-official" documents? There is no way of telling. David's death certificate—registered May 14th 1928 following his death of May 11th, 1928—states that he was born in 1859 in a month and on a day "unknown". Data in the 1910 Federal Census for the David Korshak household states that he was forty-four—and therefore born in 1866. Similar data for the 1920 Federal Census states that he was fifty-six—and therefore born in 1863 or 1864. There is no way to demonstrate with certainty that any of these dates is the correct one.

¹³ Emigrated 1878. In U. S. twenty-two years. Fannie died May 6th, 1944 and was buried in the Rosehill Cemetery Mausoleum. Cemetery records state that her age, at the time of her death, was "sixty-five years, four months and twelve days" (apparently recapitulated from her death certificate). That Fannie was only sixty-five when she dies is highly improbable. If her age was stated correctly, she would have emigrated to the United States a year before her birth (though there is no guarantee that the date of her emigration given in the census is correct). Moreover, she would have given birth to her first child at age nine.

¹⁹ Israel Missner had owned the flat at 1219 S. Morgan almost eight years when the 1900 Federal Census was taken. As near as I can determine, he was the first member of the family to have purchased the home in which he lived (it was also, as the note above shows, income-producing property). The fact that the Missners were property-owners (and had reached this status only a decade after their immigration) may explain their disenchantment with Jessie's turn-of-the-century romance with Max M. Korshak—for the Korshak, who had come to Chicago around the time of the Missners, had not yet acquired real estate. Israel Missner purchased the 1219 Morgan building from a Leo Mutter (who may have been an organist at nearby Saint Ignatius College) on July 6th, 1892 for \$4,300 (Cook County Recorder of Deeds, Book 3854/Page 460). The Missners simultaneously executed two mortgages: the first for \$2000 (3736/541), the second 3746/542 (Sarah Missner signed the trust deeds with an "X"). This example shows that even a pedler could realize an important element of the American dream in a relatively short period of time—

Two children, one living. Fanny's 1944 obituary indicated that she was survived by sisters Margaret (Slack) of Providence, RI and Pearl (Baum) of Los Angeles, in addition to her half-brother, Lewis (given in the 1900 census as "Louis").

²⁸ Half-brother of Fannie, later physician of David. Changed surname to "Brown".
